• All Saints' CE Primary School (formally VA) was originally built in 1869 for the education of the poor children of the parish of All Saints Church. It was rebuilt in 1974 as a First School and extended in 2011 to become a full primary school with pupils up to Year 6 from September 2012.



All saints' Church of England

- There are high numbers of pupils in the school for whom English is not their first language, compared to nationals (the school has 53% against a national figure of 20.2% 2023. Currently, there are 22 different languages spoken by our pupils.
- The school has taken 3 Afghan refugees and several Ukranian refugees in the last two years.





There are more pupils from minority ethnic groups, at 68.5%, than white British. Compared with **36.1% nationally.** This figure has grown rapidly during the last few years, from 13% in 2011 to current figures. This means that the school is culturally enriched but linguistically deprived as most of our EAL families are first generation with parents who also struggle with the complexities of the English language.





- 18% of pupils (36 pupils) are registered as having SEND. The school currently has 9 pupils with EHCPs with 2 pending)
- 23% FSM
- The school sits in the top quintile for both SEND Support, mobility and EAL pupils.

School context

All Saints School is situated in the centre of Newmarket, a short walk from the church, museum and other places of interest. Originally founded in 1869 and rebuilt in 1974, it became a full primary school with pupils up to year six in September 2012. It now has 199 pupils, 39% have English as a second language. Since 2014 there have been a number of teaching staff changes, significantly a new head and new deputy head.

The distinctiveness and effectiveness of Newmarket All Saints School as a Church of England school are outstanding.

- The new head and deputy head lead and inspire an enthusiastic and dedicated team of staff, governors and parents, totally committed to raising standards and promoting strong Christian values.
- Religious education lessons are exciting and use lively enquiry methods to enable pupils to discover, compare and respect world religions. These include termly visits to different places of worship, role play and well-informed discussion.
- Excellent displays, including creative prayer and reflection stations, leave visitors in no doubt that this is a church school.

1.1 Historic Foundation

In October 1868, the Revd TR Govett arrived in Newmarket to take up the role of Vicar of All Saints Church. He found that there was no school in this part of the town, and he decided that this needed to change. Despite being told that he "could never accomplish the scheme he was taking in hand", his "kind-hearted energy" inspired the whole community to work together. The Duke of Rutland gave "an excellent site adjacent to the Vicarage-grounds" and contributed generously, as did the Vicar himself and many other local people. All Saints' National School was opened on November 18th 1869, just over a year after the Vicar's arrival in the town.

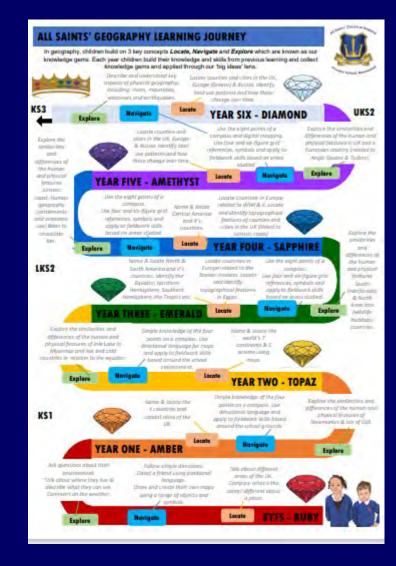


Our Crown of Knowledge rests on a 'Cushion' of Big ideas

Although the All Saints' Crown of Knowledge is based on the National Curriculum, we have developed this further to answer the specific needs of our children. Our pedagogy rests on six Big Ideas, which act as a cognitive framework, guilding our selection and presentation of knowledge gems, so that there is an underlying coherence in what we are teaching and the children's understanding deepens year by year.

Our Big Ideas are:

- Language: Understanding subject specific vocabulary and the development of language; allowing children to articulate their ideas.
- Britain: Relating to the impact of significant historical and geographical events technological, scientific and cultural shifts that have shaped the locality and modern Britain.
- People: Children will learn from the examples of prominent people who achieve or rise above their beginnings.
- Faith: Understanding and appreciating the Christian faith and the beliefs and values of those in our school community and the world fostering mutual respect.
- Migration: Why do people move from (or invade) one country and travel to another and what legacy do they bring?
- Creativity: How has creativity enriched our culture and teaching children the skills to be increasingly creative?

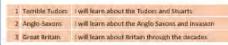

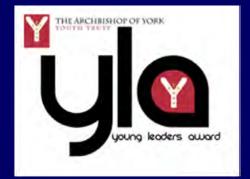
MAT Passport

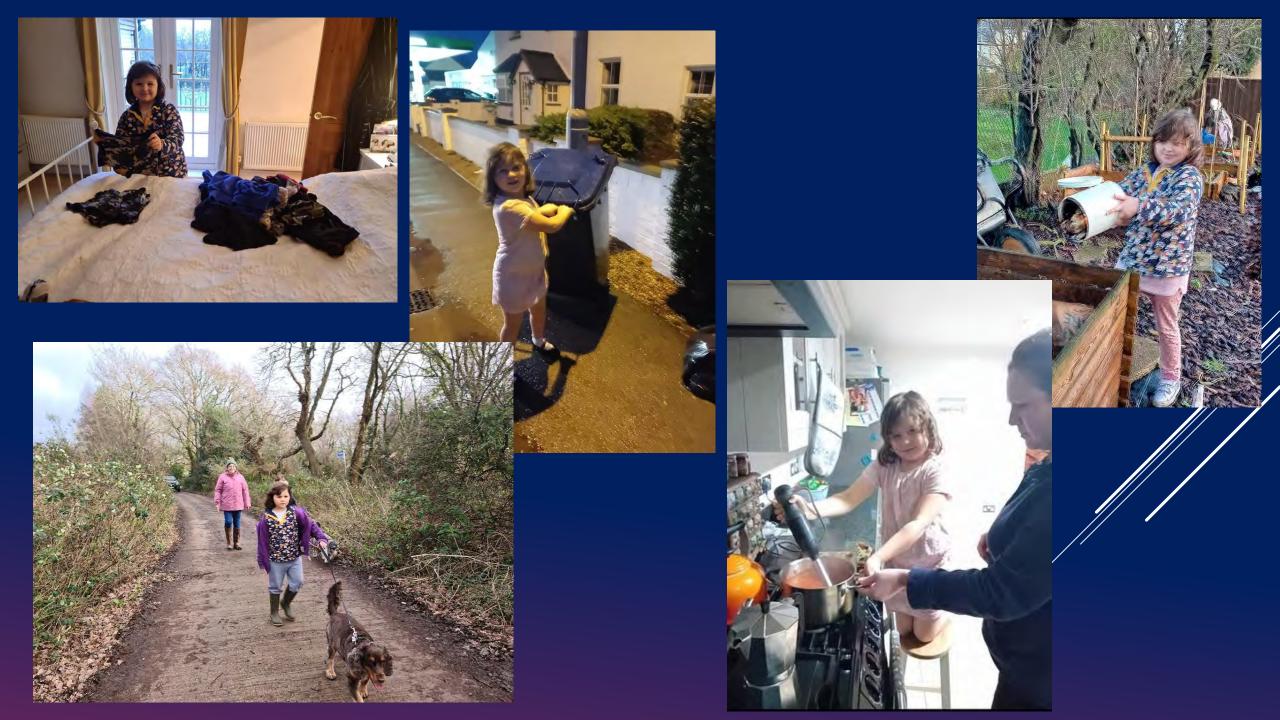

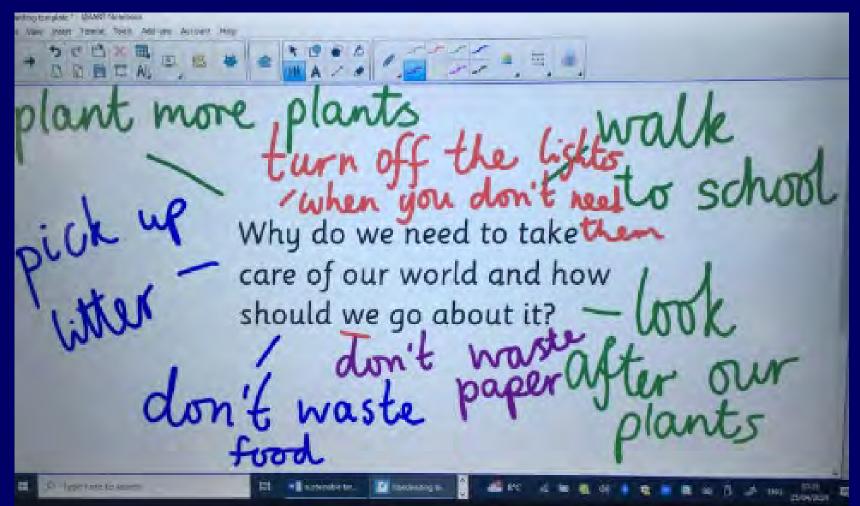

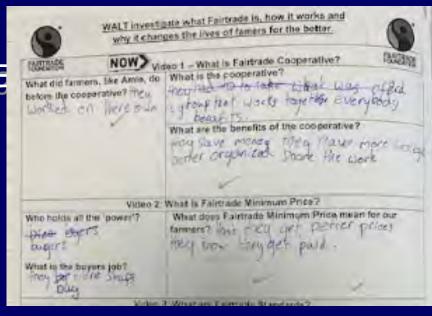

Year 5 Fairtrade

During our Geography unit 'Trade and Economics' Year 5 learnt about Fair Trade and the impact it has on people around the world. Through watching videos, based on people working on Fair Trade farms, children were able to answer questions linked to what it is, what does it support and how it helps.



WALT investigate what Fairtrade is, how it works and why it changes the lives of famers for the better.

Imagine you are on the Premium Committee for a Fairtrade tea estate. You have just received £1000 in Fairtrade Premium and must decide how it is going to be spent.

You and your group of 4/5 represent all of the 100 workers living in five villages around the tea estate. There are 20 houses in each village.

• None of the villages have electricity.

• There is a healthcare clinic in one of the villages with one doctor.

• There is a primary school and a secondary school but not enough teachers.

• A lot of children cannot afford to go to secondary school.

• There is often flooding which damages the houses and during certain times of the year there is little food.

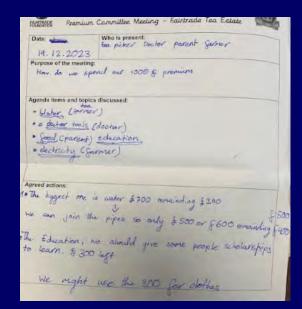
• Three of the villages have access to clean drinking water.

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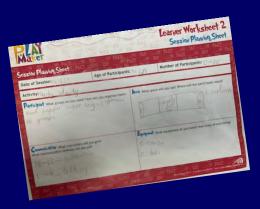


Year 5 have taken on the responsibility of Play Leaders.

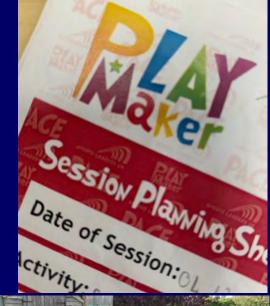
During Autumn term we had 6 weeks training on how to be effective Play Leaders. The training involved 4 areas- Participants,

Ensuring a Balanced Approach to Religious Education

For many years, RE teachers worked with a dual approach of "Learning about religion and belief" and 'Learning from religion and belief". Current research "2 suggests RE in schools is better presented as a blend of academic disciplines, in particular theology, human and social science, and philosophy, and that, applied to learning in RE, these provide a more balanced picture of religions and worldviews, which in turn leads to better religious literacy.

"Where do I stand?" sets out an RE curriculum with these disciplines in mind. The three disciplines are present in each key stage but with the emphasis shifting slightly, so that human and social science may be more obvious in the Early Years and Key Stage 1, theology in Key Stage 2 and philosophy in Key Stage 3.

Theology in RE involves enquiry into:

- . Key beliefs / concepts of a religion or worldview, both distinctive and shared
- Sources of authority for religious beliefs e.g. sacred texts, religious leaders, divine revelation
- · Particular beliefs about God, humanity, life, and the nature of an after-life
- Differences in interpretation of key beliefs and changes in religious belief across time / culture

Human and Social Science in RE involves exploration of:

- · Different customs, celebrations and rituals based on religious and secular beliefs
- · The influence of sacred texts and religious leaders on communities
- Diverse interpretations of religious practices in different societies locally and globally, and at different times
- Moral, ethical and practical lifestyle choices based on secular or religious worldviews

Philosophy in RE involves engagement with:

- . Ultimate questions of truth, morality, purpose and meaning in life
- Questions arising from religious and secular standpoints, texts or customs
- . Conflicting answers offered by religious and non-religious groups and individuals.
- Changes in questions / answers over time and across societies

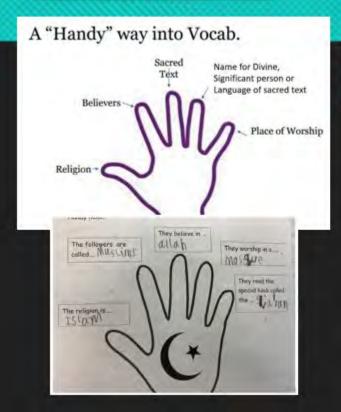

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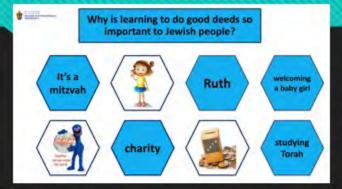
